The ultimate goals of the programme are to encourage young women to take up journalism as their profession and promote gender equality in the field of journalism.

Since its inception in 1994, News Network has been pursuing a plan for developing female journalists in Bangladesh as they account for less than 3 percent in journalism among the total number of journalists in the country. A gender balance is, therefore, needed in this profession.

New Network thinks:

- The profession can be a big employer for female graduates who come out from universities
- Women journalists can report incidents/events related to gender violence against girls and women more humanly with a better human approach
- The Constitution of Bangladesh guarantees equal treatment to men and women. So, there is no reason to leave the journalism profession only to the hands of men

The programme is highly relevant and has had multiple impacts on society.

- A trained and skilled woman journalist does not only empower herself but also sends out a message of women power across the media world
- Such a journalist can be a model for others
- Women journalists bring with them gender balance in the media houses
- They are better suited to deal, write and broadcast issues related to gender bias, violence and gender equality
- Women tend to be honest, serious and hardworking.

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The organisation believes if the country's female graduates can be encouraged to choose journalism as their profession that will be a big achievement for bringing a change in the traditional attitude, which will ultimately help promote women empowerment. News Network had long been trying to raise fund to this end.

The initiative did not go in vain. The dream came true in 1999 when Diakonia, a Swedish organisation, came forward and agreed to support News Network to launch a six-month fellowship programme for female journalists in the country. Immediately, the programme drew attention of various international funding agencies, organisations and foreign missions in Dhaka.

With the Diakonia's support, the programme was run for multiple years. In the last 10 years, different world reputed international organisations and donors, including, NORAD, DANIDA, Free Voice, Free Press Unlimited, USAID and US States Department provided support for carrying out this programme.

This initiative to develop women journalists is one of the most successful programmes of News Network as it is highly appreciated by the country's mainstream news media houses, universities and civil society members.

As many as 250 women have been trained under this programme as of 2012. Sixty percent of them are already working in the mainstream journalism.

But it is still a long way to go because the number of female journalists remains very low in Bangladesh journalism.
